The following petition was then read and referred to the Road and Bridge Committee:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Madison County, Edwardsville, Illinois.

Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned taxpayers and citizens of Chouteau Township, hereby petition your honorable body to extend the concrete paving of the Poag Road from the end of the present improvement at Poag, so as to hard surface the 3-mile dirt road gap which connects with the Edwardsville hard road at the Mitchell Public School.

This is the only highway serving the 200 railway employees and \$5,000,000.00 railway property at Lennox with its repair shops, extensive switch yards and important terminal connections with five railway systems.

It is the main market road for the melon growers and farmers of the Poag vicinity.

Five hundred people live on or near this route, and it is used daily by approximately half the pupils of the Mitchell Public School.

This road is shorter, above overflow, and has no dangerous railroad crossings.

Being a midway route it will relieve the growing congestion on both the Alton and Edwardsville roads.

In view of the large number of railway employees, farmers, and school children who are vitally interested, your petitioners will greatly appreciate favorable action from your Honorable Body.

The following petition was then

read and referred to the Road and Bridge Committee:

To the Madison County Board of Supervisors,
Edwardsville, Illinois.
Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned, property owners and parties interested in the road beginning at the north end of Humbert Street at the Alton City Limits, and running thence North to a connection with the Brighton Road near Godfrey, hereby petition your honorable body to designate the said section of public road a State Aid Route of the County of Madison, the said road being described as follows:

Beginning at the North end of Humbert Street at the Alton city limits, and running thence North and Northeast through Section 36, Wood River Township; thence North and Northwest through Section 31, Foster Township and crossing the line between said Section 31, Foster Township and Section 36, Godfrey Township near the Northeast corner of said Section 36; thence Northwest to a road on the North line of land of C. E. Pettengill; thence West along said road to the overhead bridge on the Chicago & Alton Railroad, where an intersection is made with the Alton and Brighton Road, thence following the Alton-Brighton Road to its intersection with the State Aid Road leading East from Godfrey at a point near the Godfrey depot of the Chicago & Alton Railroad.

Your petitioners would represent that this route, if made a State Aid Route would be of great service to the community and would serve also as a connecting route between Godfrey and State Bond Issue Route No. 111, and the City of Alton, and points South to Wood River and Granite City.

The said route is a rural mail route and a milk route.

The following petition was then

read and referred to the Road and Bridge Committee:

Mr. Chairman and Members of the County Board of Supervisors:

Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned, parties interested in the road between Marine and State Aid Route 3-B, the same being the road beginning at Marine and running North $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles, hereby petition your honorable body to designate as a State Aid Route the said road above referred to and include the same in the oil program of Madison County and oil treat same.

The section of road petitioned to be made a State Aid Route is described as follows:

Beginning at a point on State Aid Route 3-B said point being at the Southeast corner of the Southwest quarter of the Southwest quarter of Section 33 in Alhambra Township, Madison County, running thence South along the present highway through the Westerly $\frac{1}{2}$ of Sections 4, 9, and 16 to the North Village Limits of Marine.

Your petitioners wish to represent that State Aid Routes of Madison County are now established beginning at Livingston, running South to Alhambra, also from State Bond Issue Route Number 160 South through Kaufman to the North end of the road above described, also beginning at Marine and running south through St. Jacob to the St. Clair County line, thereby making a State Aid Route running North and South through Madison County practically from County Line to County Line with the exception of the $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles of road lying just North of Marine and which is herein petitioned.

Your petitioners would further represent that the present highway system between St. Jacob and Marine is now constructed of concrete and the remaining portion from the North line of Marine Township North to Livingston is now oiled,

the only portion of the road across Madison County between Livingston and St. Jacob not improved being that portion of the road in Marine Township which is not now a State Aid Route.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your body approve the road above described as a State Aid Route and that the same be oil treated during the season of 1930 thereby connecting the entire route across this portion of the County with oil or concrete which would be of very great benefit to the traveling public in Madison County.

The following petition was then read and referred to the Road and Bridge Committee.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the County Board of Supervisors:

Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned, parties interested in the road between Bethalto and Fosterburg hereby petition your honorable body to designate as a State Aid Route the following described section of public highway:

The highway beginning at the North village limits of Bethalto, said point being approximately 1600 feet North of the Southeast corner of Section 1 in Wood River Township; thence North along the present highway to the Southeast corner of Section 36 in Foster Township; thence along the present highway Northwesterly through the East $\frac{1}{2}$ of Section 36 to a point at or near the Southwest corner of the Northeast quarter of the Southeast quarter of Section 25 in Foster Township; thence Westerly along the present highway through Section 25 and between Sections 26 and 35 in Foster Township to the Southwest corner of Section 26 in said Foster Township; thence North approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ mile thence West approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile to intersect with State Aid Route

Number 5 near the Southwest corner of the Northwest quarter of the Southeast quarter of Section 27 in Foster Township.

Your petitioners represent that the above described section of public highway would be a great benefit to the users of the road between the Village of Bethalto and Foster Township and is of sufficient importance to warrant same being made a State Aid Route of Madison County and your petitioners pray that your honorable body take the necessary action to designate said road as a State Aid Route of Madison County.

(Signed by 98 signers).

The following petition was then read and referred to the Road and Bridge Committee.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the County Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen:

Wo, the undersigned, parties interested in the road between Wanda and State Bond Issue Route Number 160, hereby petition your honorable body to designate as a State Aid Route the following described section of public highway.

The highway beginning at a point on State Bond Issue Route Number 160, said point being at or near the center of Section 7 in Fort Russell Township in Madison County, thence south along the present highway through Sections 7 and 18 to a point at or near the southwest corner of the southeast quarter of said Section 18, thence east along the present highway one half mile to the northwest corner of Section 20 in said Fort Russell Township; thence south along the present road between Sections 19 and 20; 29 and 30 to a point at or near the southwest corner of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of Section 29; thence west and southwesterly along the present road through Sections 30 and 31 to a point near the center of said Section

31; thence northwesterly along the present road approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile; thence southwesterly and southerly along the present road to intersect with State Aid Route Number 1 at Wanda, which point of intersection is at or near the Northwest corner of Section 6 in Edwardsville Township, Madison County.

Your petitioners represent that the above described section of highway would be of great benefit to the users of the road in this locality, and that such road if designated as a State Aid Route, will complete a State Aid Route in a northerly direction from Mitchell, through Poag, Wanda, Bethalto, Moro and Dorsey to connect with State Bond Route 112, thereby being of great importance as a connecting route in the county system.

Your petitioners pray that your honorable body take the necessary action to designate the said road as above described as a State Aid Route.

The following resolution was then read and referred to the Road and Bridge Committee.

Resolution with reference to County Road Building Program.

Be It Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Madison County, Illinois: That this Board reaffirms and adopts the resolution adopted by a former board at a meeting thereof held in the City of Edwardsville, Illinois, on Tuesday, September 13, 1927, which said Resolution selected and determined the State Aid Roads of Madison County which should in the order named in said resolution, be improved by this County and being the roads mentioned in Items first to fifty inclusive in said resolution, and which said resolution and the adoption thereof was recommended by C. A. Yancey, E. C. Willi; Gus Haller, and H. W. Kennecke, who were members of the then Road and Bridge

Committee of said Board.

Be It Further Resolved, That, whereas, the road mentioned under the Fourth Item of said resolution leading easterly from Granite City to a connection with State Bond Issue Route No. 11, for a short distance thereof, crosses Cahokia Creek bottom, and near, and on both sides of the intersection with said Cahokia Creek necessarily passes over land which is exceedingly low, wet and swampy, and where, on account thereof, filling will be required to a considerable depth, so that it would be impracticable to lay a concrete slab or other permanent hard roadway thereon until after the elapse of two or more years to permit the settlement of said fill; That on account of such conditions to permit the carrying out of said road construction program, in the order named in said resolution so adopted on the 13th day of September, 1927, it will be necessary that said fill be constructed as soon as possible, and,

Whereas, in order to construct said road, in accordance with the requirements of the State Highway Department of the State of Illinois as to alignment, grade, etc., and to make said necessary fills, it will be necessary to acquire new right-of-way, and,

Whereas, Plans and Specifications have already been prepared showing the location, extent and description of the necessary right of way to be acquired for the purposes aforesaid, together with an estimate of the cost of making said fill, which said estimate of cost is the sum of approximately \$22,700.00.

Now, Therefore, Be It Further Resolved, that the Right of Way Committee of this Board be and are hereby directed to receive donations of grants of right of way along the said route of said road in accordance with said survey, plans and specifications, and that as soon as the deeds for the

right of way, necessary to be obtained in order to make said fills, have been delivered to said Road and Bridge Committee, that the said committee, be and are hereby authorized and directed out of the first moneys available to advertise for bids for such work as may be necessary to be done in order to construct said fills, including all necessary culverts, bridges, drains and other works reasonably necessary therefor.

Be It Further Resolved, That Whereas: By said resolution of September 13, 1927, the exact location of the said road is not clearly specified;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved: That said road when finally completed shall extend from Granite City to a point in the Northeasterly corner of Section 5, in the Town of Collinsville, near Peters Station, and thence Easterly and Southeasterly by the shortest and most practical route to a connection with State Bond Issue Route No. 11, at the City of Troy, together with a branch connection from said point at Peters, Illinois, easterly and northeasterly to connect with the hard roadway already constructed from State Bond Issue Route No. 159 to the Village of Glen Carbon.

Be It Further Resolved, That Whereas, the road mentioned under the Fifty Item of said resolution of September 13, 1927, being the road leading from State Bond Route 4 at Hamel, Easterly to Alhambra, has already been constructed by the State of Illinois, and therefore eliminated as a part of said original resolution,

Be It Further Resolved by this Board, that the following roads be substituted and be the roads constructed, as and instead of the road named and located under the fifth item of such resolution, the same to be constructed in the order named, as follows:

A. Dorsey Station, Moro and Be-thalto shall be connected by the

shortest practical route to State Bond Route 112 and State Bond Route 160.

B. A road beginning at State Bond Route 11 at or near the southeast corner of the Southwest quarter of the Northeast quarter of Section 22 in Collinsville Township; thence West along the shortest most practical route to a point near the center of Section 23 in Nameoki Township.

C. The unimproved portion of State Aid Route No. 7 between Marine and Highland.

D. State Aid Route No. 5 between Fosterburg and State Bond Route Number 160.

E. State Aid Route 19, between Poag and a connection with State Bond Issue Route Number 4 at Mitchell.

Be It Further Resolved that the roads named be constructed of sufficient width and of such material as shall best be adapted to meet the requirements of traffic thereon and also to entitle the County of Madison to refund thereafter.

The following petition was then read and referred to the Road and Bridge Committee.

To the Honorable Members of the Board of Supervisors,
of Madison County, Illinois.
Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned land owners abutting on, or making use of that part of the Brighton Road, beginning at the North end of Alby Street, in said city of Alton, and extending to the and connecting with the now cinder road and extending to the North Madison County line, be made a County Road.

Hoping that your body may give this favorable consideration.

(Signed by 21 parties.)

The following petition was then read and referred to the Road and Bridge Committee.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Madison County Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned parties, interested in the location and designation of a State Aid Route, which is proposed to be located in a Northerly direction through the center of Piasa Township in Jersey County and intersecting the Jersey-Madison County line at or near the Northwest corner of fractional Section 3 in Godfrey Township, Madison County, hereby petition your honorable body to designate as a State Aid Route the following road in Madison County:

Beginning at a point on the Jersey-Madison County Line at or near the Northwest corner of fractional Section 3 in Godfrey Township, Madison County, thence South along the present highway along the section line dividing sections 3 and 4, 9 and 10, to intersect with State Aid Route No. 12 at or near the Southwest corner of the Northwest quarter of Section 10 in Godfrey Township.

Your petitioners wish to represent that Jersey County is now taking the necessary action to designate as a State Aid Route the present road from the North end of the road above described Northerly through Piasa Township, and the connection described above which is approximately 3-4 miles in length in Madison County, would provide a very desirable connection to the North of the improvement now being constructed in Madison County designated as Section 47 M. F. T.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your body will designate the said road as a State Aid Route in conjunction with like action of the County Board of Jersey County.

On June 5th you were notified of our conditional approval of Section 45 M. F. T. which provides for the construction of approximately 2½ miles of 16 foot gravel roadway on State Aid Route 4B.

On May 14, 1930 the Board of Supervisors of Madison County passed a resolution requesting that the description of this section be changed as follows:

Section 45 M. F. T. provides for the construction of approximately 1½ miles of 18 foot concrete pavement on State Aid Route 4B.

This is to advise that the above mentioned resolution was approved today, subject to the same conditions outlined in our letter of June 5th.

Dear Sir:

It has been quite some time since our new Illinois Gas Tax Law went into effect, and all counties are receiving their proportionate share of that incoming revenue. The law provides that counties may use their share of the funds for the improvement of roads or bridges, practically as they see fit; however, with a few qualifications. This particular option given the counties as to the disposition of their funds has caused much difficulty among the counties. Each Commissioner from his particular district has of course strong desires that a particular road within his district should be improved.

This continued disagreement among the Commissioners has brought about a situation approaching chaos. In only a few isolated instances have the counties been able to agree on the exact disposition of their share of the funds, and only those who have decided to issue bonds in anticipation of their funds have been able to solve their problems. By the issuing of bonds, the counties are able to distribute their improvement over the entire county and all roads are constructed at the same time; thus no township receives unequal benefit.

This letter is being written in order to help you solve your problem as it undoubtedly exists. We hope that if after the suggestion is made at your next meeting of the Commissioners, they should decide to accept this plan, that you will allow us to help you with all the details necessary in accomplishing the issuance of bonds under this new law. Our most recent underwriting under this law was an

issue of \$1,250,000 road bonds for Lake County, Illinois. We believe that the experience which we have acquired in connection with such underwritings as this one would be very much to your benefit, and we would be pleased to give you the benefit of this experience.

We would appreciate a letter from you in regard to the Commissioners' reaction to this suggestion. If there are any further details which you care to have us enlarge upon, in connection with the issuing of road bonds, we will be pleased to go into the subject with you in as much detail as you care to have us.

Dear Sir:

The Board of Supervisors of Madison County at its meeting March 12, 1930, passed a resolution requesting several changes in its State Aid System.

A number of these changes were approved today. Those approved are described as follows:

1. The abandonment of that portion of State Aid Route 2 beginning at its intersection with State Aid Route 4A in section 15, Moro Township and extending thence north to the Macoupin County line.

2. The abandonment of that portion of State Aid Route 8 beginning at State Bond Issue Route 11 and extending thence south to the St. Clair County line.

3. An addition beginning at a point on the south limits of Livingston near the northwest corner of

section 22, T. 6 N., R. 6 W. of the 3rd P. M. and extending thence south $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles, thence southeasterly to the north limits of Alhambra.

4. An addition beginning at a point on State Bond Issue Route 4 near the center of section 31, Nameoki Township and extending thence southwesterly approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile to an intersection with section 53-15d, St. Clair County.

Kindly send in your copy of the official State Aid Map for correction and certification.

The remaining changes cannot be approved at this time for the following reasons:

State Aid Route 12B beginning at the north limits of Alton and extending northwesterly was abandoned by resolution dated May 14, 1925 and approved by this Department on June 1, 1925.

The proposed addition beginning at Prrietown and extending thence northeasterly to State Bond Issue Route 4 at the Macoupin County Line cannot be approved until the portion on the county line has been designated by Macoupin County.

The proposed addition extending north and northwesterly from Worden cannot be approved because it is in a territory already well served by State Aid roads and is not a direct route which would benefit traffic condition.

The proposed addition extending north from State Aid Route 14 in section 28, Omphgent Township is in a territory already well served by State Aid roads and connects with other proposed routes which cannot be approved.

The proposed addition beginning at State Aid Route 4B, Saline Township and extending easterly to State Bond Issue Route 11, does not connect additional trading points and would not benefit county traffic.

The proposed addition beginning

at St. Jacob and extending southerly to the St. Clair County line cannot be approved until St. Clair County provides a satisfactory connection with its State Aid System.

The proposed addition beginning at State Bond Issue Route 4, Nameoki Township has been approved only as far as section 53-15d because the remaining portion does not connect with the State Aid System of St. Clair County.

If the county supplies further information which will remove our objections to the routes not approved we will be glad to reconsider our action.

The plans, specifications and estimate for the above section were approved by this department today.

Your file copy of the approval plans is being returned to you under separate cover.

I wish to call your attention to the following points relative to the plans and estimate:

1. You will note a number of correction which we have made in red crayon.

2. We estimate the class X concrete at 142.8 cu. yds. instead of 142.1 cu. yds. This quantity was not changed in the estimate.

3. Reinforcing steel has been corrected from 7,560 lbs. to 7,430 lbs.

4. The guard fence has been corrected from 1,200 lineal ft. to 5,000 lineal ft.

5. The price of cement has been

changed from \$1.92 per bbl. to \$1.67 per bbl.

6. The above corrections change the total estimated cost including cement, from \$94,327 to \$95,534.

7. In advertising this improvement and in preparing your contract you should use the new forms prepared by this department, which correspond to the 1930 specifications.

Sometime ago when I was in East St. Louis, you spoke to me about changes in the balance points which had been made by Mr. Slaymaker and stated that you had another way of taking care of the corrections which he had made rather than changing all of the balance points. This matter should be taken up with Mr. Slaymaker and any solution that is satisfactory to him will be satisfactory with this office.

The plans, specifications and estimate for the above section were approved by this department today.

While the plans for this improvement are being approved at this time it is understood that the improvement will not be constructed, nor will a contract be approved by this department until the Village of New Douglas is given a connection with State Bond Issue Route 4 as outlined in my letter of June 5, 1930, approving the preliminary resolution

Your file copy of the approved plans is being returned to you under separate cover.

I wish to call your attention to the following points relative to the plans, estimate and proposal:

1. You will note a number of corrections which we have indicated in red crayon.
2. We have inserted special provisions No. 2, 3 and 4, which are to be used with the 1930 specifications. No. 2 and 3 should be revised to fit the intentions of the county. Paint for marginal bars, as well as that for steel bridges may be obtained by the contractor from this department at cost, f. o. b. Springfield.
3. The class X concrete has been changed from 233.0 cu. yds. to 233.2 cu. yds.
4. The reinforcing steel has been corrected from 18,385 lbs. to 19,685 lbs.
5. The class A concrete has been corrected from 3.6 cu. yds. to 4.9 cu. yds.
6. 4.6 units of hedge pulling, which was included in the proposal but not in the estimate has been added to the estimate at \$7.00 per unit.
7. 1,084 lineal ft. of wire road guard which was included in the proposal but not in the estimate has

been added to the estimate at 75 cents per lineal ft.

8. The above corrections change the total estimated cost, including cement, from \$48,278 to \$47,245.

9. I wish to call your attention to the fact that the specifications require water-soaking for all fills more than 3 feet in depth on paving sections. There are a number of such fills on this section.

The plans, specifications and estimate for the above section were approved by this department today.

While the plans for this improvement are being approved at this time it is understood that the improvement will not be constructed, nor will a contract be approved by this department until the Village of New Douglas is given a connection with State Bond Issue Route 4 as outlined in my letter of June 5, 1930, approving the preliminary resolution.

The design of the intersection with State Bond Issue Route 160 as shown on these plans is not in accordance with the design for this intersection which was furnished you by Mr. Slaymaker on March 31. These plans are, therefore, approved upon condition that this intersection be revised in accordance with the details which were furnished you on that date.

Your file copy of the approved plans is being returned to you under separate cover.

I wish to call your attention to the

following points relative to the plans, estimate and proposals:

1. You will note a number of corrections which we have indicated in red crayon.

2. We have inserted in the proposal special provisions No. 2, 3, and 4. No. 2 and 3 should be revised to fit the intentions of the county. Contractors may obtain paint for bridges, as well as that for marginal bars in the pavement from this department at cost, f. o. b. Springfield.

3. The price of cement has been corrected from \$1.92 per bbl. to \$1.67 per bbl.

4. The total estimated cost, including cement, has been corrected from \$26,443 to \$25,561.

5. The vertical curve at Station 3 should be 300 feet long instead of 200 feet long.

6. We suggest that either Standard gutter design 1356 or 1359 of this department be used instead of the gutter design which you have included in your plans. Prints of these designs have been attached to the plans.

sound as far as could be determined. Accessible seams and tube ends were tight. The blow-off pipes, fusible plug and other attachments were in good order. The steam gauges were not tested. The settings and linings were in satisfactory repair.

The main steam pipes were not under pressure. No signs of leakage were noted. The pipes were well supported and had ample provisions for expansion and drainage.

During more than four years they have learned the value of team work. The patient who enters finds himself carefully registered at the admitting desk. He is checked in by the nursing staff; his meals come through on time; personal comfort is provided; cleanliness is the order. All this inspires in him the will to get well.

A smoothly working staff is a joy to every patient, an asset to any hospital.

Entertainment and Recreation.

During the past year, the patient have been fortunate indeed to have had rendered to them the monthly program of the Music section of the Monday Club, Edwardsville. Miss K. V. Dickinson, Alton and a group of friends also favored us with a delightful musical program. The most recent treat was the Red Crown Band of Wood River. To all of these artists we are grateful.

Religious Life:

Religious services are held weekly by our friends of the Baptist Church at Troy, under their new pastor Rev. William Bohn. Rev. Ray, who is now in Collinsville, and his choir hold services on the last Thursday of each month.

Those patients of Catholic faith are ministered to by their priests. Father Meagher and Father Eckhard and the Lutherans by Rev. E. W. Jahn.

The Lutheran Choir, Collinsville, rendered special music on Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter.

It is encouraging to observe that those remaining in the hospital until treatment is completed, increase in number from year to year. It is likewise encouraging to find that the beginning or the moderately advanced tuberculosis patient is seeking treatment before the disease becomes advanced. This accounts for the gradually decreasing death rate.

At the present time, nine children are under treatment. Four of these are victims of bone tuberculosis.

During the calendar year 1929. Four hundred eighty-four patients were examined, either at the Sanitarium or at Alton. The physicians who refer patients to the clinics for examination are increasing in number in our county. It is worth noting that the entire tuberculosis program is whole-heartedly sponsored by the Madison County Medical Society.

There is a large waiting list of patients in our own county in addition to numerous requests for admission by non-resident patients.

Gentlemen:

We, your Road and Bridge Committee, to whom was referred the resolution with reference to the County Road Building Program, as read at the morning session of this Board, would recommend that the following resolution as read be adopted:

Resolution with Reference to County Road Building Program.

Be It Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Madison County, Illinois: That this Board reaffirms and adopts the Resolution adopted by a former Board at a meeting thereof held in the City of Edwardsville, Illinois; on Tuesday, September 13, 1927, which said Resolution selected and determined the State Aid Roads of Madison County which should in the order named in said Resolution, be improved by this county and being the roads mentioned in Items first to fifty inclusive in said Resolution, and which said Resolution and the adoption thereof was recommended by C. A. Yancey; E. C. Willi; Gus Haller; and H. W. Kennecke, who were members of the then Road and Bridge Committee of said Board.

Be It Further Resolved, That, whereas, the road mentioned under the Fourth Item of said resolution leading Easterly from Granite City to a connection with State Bond Issue

Route No. 11, for a short distance thereof, crosses Cahokia Creek bottom, and near, and on both sides of the intersection with said Cahokia Creek necessarily passes over land which is exceedingly low, wet and swampy, and where, on account thereof filling will be required to a considerable depth, so that it would be impracticable to lay a concrete slab or other permanent hard roadway thereon until after the elapse of two or more years to permit the settlement of said fill; That on account of such conditions to permit the carrying out of said road construction program, in the order named in said Resolution so adopted on the 13th day of September, 1927, it will be necessary that said fill be constructed as soon as possible, and,

Whereas, in order to construct said road, in accordance with the requirements of the State Highway Department of the State of Illinois as to alignment, grade, etc., and to make said necessary fills, it will be necessary to acquire a new right-of-way; and,

Whereas, plans and specifications have already been prepared showing the location, extent and description of the necessary right of way to be acquired for the purposes aforesaid, together with an estimate of the cost of making said fill, which said estimate of cost is the sum of approximately \$22,700.00.

Now, Therefore, Be It Further Resolved, That the Right of Way Committee of this Board be and are hereby directed to receive donations of grants of right of way along the said route of said road in accordance with said survey, plans and specifications, and that as soon as the deeds for the right of way, necessary to be obtained in order to make said fills, have been delivered to said Road and Bridge Committee, that the said committee, be and are hereby authorized and directed out of the first moneys

available to advertise for bids for such work as may be necessary to be done in order to construct said fills, including all necessary culverts, bridges, drains, and other works reasonably necessary therefor.

Be It Further Resolved, That Whereas: By said Resolution of September 13, 1927, the exact location of the said road is not clearly specified;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved: That said road when finally completed shall extend from Granite City to a point in the Northeastly corner of Section 5, in the Town of Collinsville, near Peters Station, and thence Easterly and Southeasterly by the shortest and most practical route to a connection with State Bond Issue Route No. 11, at the City of Troy, together with a branch connection from said point at Peters, Illinois, Easterly and Northeastly to connect with the hard roadway already constructed from State Bond Issue Route No. 159 to the Village of Glen Carbon.

Be It Further Resolved, That whereas, the road mentioned under the Fifth Item of said resolution of September 13, 1927, being the road leading from State Bond Route 4 at Hamel, Easterly to Alhambra, has already been constructed by the State of Illinois, and therefore eliminated as a part of said original resolution.

Be It Further Resolved by this Board, that the following roads be substituted and be the roads constructed, as and instead of the road named and located under the Fifth Item of such resolution, the same to be constructed in the order named, as follows:

A. Dorsey Station, Moro and Bethalto shall be connected by the shortest practical route to State Bond Route 112 and State Bond Route 160.

Please be advised that Smith-Hurd Illinois Revised Statues, 1929, section 349, the same being paragraph 9 of the election laws reads as follows and is self explanatory:

"Any voter who may declare upon oath that he can not read the English language, or that by reasons of physical disability he is unable to use the voting machine, shall, upon request, be assisted by two of the election officers of different parties to be selected from the judges and clerks of the precinct in which they are to act, to be designated by the judges of election at the opening of the polls; however, if such physical disability is by reason of blindness, the voter may be assisted in marking his ballot by a relative or friend of his selection, and if such blindness is apparent to a majority of the judges and clerks of the precinct the voter may be excused from making the affidavit herein required of other voters. Such relative, friend or officers, in the voter's presence and in the presence of each other, shall register his vote upon the machine for the candidates of his choice, and shall thereafter give no information regarding the same. The clerks of election shall enter upon the poll list after the name of any elector who received such assistance in registering his vote in memorandum of the fact. Intoxication shall not be regarded as physical disability, and no intoxicated person shall be entitled to assistance in registering his vote."

I have before me the letter of Otto L. Bott of Godfrey, Illinois, which states that while helping Mr. Wm. Brecht, county maintenance patrolman drag the roads, one of his mules slipped and was caught under a heavy drag, and as a result of the injuries suffered, the mule had to be killed. Mr. Bott is of the opinion that he should be compensated to the amount of about \$50.00 for the loss of said mule.

From an examination of the legal authorities, I find that there is no liability for said injury and loss suffered by Madison County. Madison County is a municipal corporation and as a municipal corporation it is not liable in a private action even on the grounds of negligence of its servants or officers in respect to the performance or nonperformance of

their duties.
