Biographical Profile

Mr. Arthur Bedian is a second generation descendent of Armenian parents, that found their way to Granite City, Illinois. His father and mother met and married at Ellis Island. He was born on August the 28th, 1922, in Granite City, Illinois.

He now resides in St. Louis, Missouri and commutes to St. Gregory Armenian Church every Sunday for worship services. He attended the church on 7th and Maple in Lincoln Place and also lived in the neighborhood, at several different locations. He lived on Niedringhaus, Maple Street, and Chestnut Street. He and his wife, Mary have one son, 37, and one daughter, 41. They have no grandchildren.

Mr. Bedian was very active within the Armenian Church and is now retired. However, during his many years of working on *The Monthly Bulletin*, he perceived the need for an Armenian/English dictionary of common words. So he spent years in this labor of love, translating and phonetically spelling the Armenian words in English. Although, his work was never published, it was copied and distributed to those individuals who wanted it.

Mr. Bedian worked at American Steel in the scientist's lab until the factory closed. From there, he and his wife moved to Detroit for about five years, until moving to St. Louis and making the 80 mile commute, back and forth to Granite City. Next October 18th, they will be celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary together.

Mr. Bedian has been a servant all his life, first to his wife, and then to his church.
