Annette Simpkins was born on 03 Feb 1931 in Granite City, IL, and lived in Lincoln Place until she married in 1952. Her father, Aranos Vartanian, arrived in the United States in 1905, and her mother, Biazar, arrived in 1908. Her mother was sent to the United States by her parents in the hope that she would have a better life. She married Aranos shortly after her arrival, and they had five daughters. As the youngest, Annette stated that she felt like and outsider because all her sisters were so much older than her. Although she speaks fluent Armenian, she never learned how to read and write the language.

Annette's father worked several different jobs, from the American Steel company, to peddling fruit and vegetables from the back of his truck throughout Granite City. He also owned the first movie theater in Granite City, but this was before Annette's birth. Her mother hand made all the girls clothes, and was described by Annette in modest and sad terms. As a child, Annette helped her father peddle fruits and vegetables on the weekends and during summer vacations from school. In addition, Annette told many humorous family stories, such as the time her father was busted by the FBI for boot-legging, and the time she accidentally sabotaged her father's chance at getting his citizenship papers. Annette met her now divorced husband at the nearby army depot, and was regretful at not teaching her children to speak Armenian.

Annette shared many vignettes about the neighborhood, and some very definite opinions about how, and why, the neighborhood changed after WWII.
