Camp Smith, Near Corinth

Records 24th 1862

Dear Mother,

Dr. M. Kellogg has just been up here to see me and some of the other boys before he goes ^{back to New Orleans} which will be tomorrow morning. He told me he would take any thing I had to send with him with greatest pleasure and so I will take this opportunity to write to you all as it is now seldom that a mail goes or comes in or from this town of Corinth as all the trains as taken by the government, and a passenger

train passes but seldom.
We have as you will see by the
heading of my letter obtained from
Picket duty which was ten miles
neared the Tenn. river than we
now are and glad we all are
to get back for we had a pretty
rough time of it out there, with
but little to eat, from the Government
and were not allowed to buy any
thing from the farms and
shot our guns off so often
foraging was but a state to
and I had to share like all
the rest, (poorly) though we all
got fat on it so I do not guess
it did us any harm after all
but on the contrary did some
of us a great deal of good
for some of the boys started out
there half sick and returned
perfectly well.

we were at one time within three miles of the enemy but they retreated to their own boats, and are now on the other side of the Tenn. River.

We are fortifying this place (Canton) very strongly and I do not think the Yankees will attempt to attack us here. Gens. Beauregard, Bragg, and Pugh are now here with several ~~and~~ Brigade Generals, so we are pretty well off for leaders.

We are now trying to get a band of musicians for our Regt. but have not yet succeeded though we have found or fix one already, the way we get them is this we go to all the Companies and ask if there are any musicians

among them if there are they ask
stuff to volunteer which they
generally do as they are then
exempt from military duty.

We are the only Regt around
here without a band and we
ought to have one as we are able
to support it if it would cost
\$1000. a month, as that would only
be \$1.00 a month apiece, for there
are 1000 men in our Regt
now, as we had an Alexandria
Company of over 100 men joining
the other day.
